Context

On I July 2013, the Education & Training Boards Act 2013 established 16 Education & Training Boards (ETBs) which replaced 33 VECs in what represents a hugely significant change in the Irish education infrastructure. ETBs have a broader remit than their predecessors, and their responsibilities include the establishment and maintenance of schools and centres of education, as well as the planning, coordination, delivery and review of much of the 2nd level and Further Education & Training provision in their areas and the provision of support services to other education and training providers.

Current FÁS training provision will also be under the remit of ETBs when the 16 FÁS Training Centres transfer to the ETBs shortly; the merge with the former VEC Adult Education services is designed to bring coherence to a fragmented system by forming an integrated further education and training sector. In addition, SOLAS, the Further Education & Training Authority which will be formally established by the end of the year, will develop a national FET strategy with goals and priorities for the ETB and wider FET sector.

There are changes afoot too in 2nd level education, particularly with the introduction of the new Junior Cycle Framework which proposes radical changes in how students' progress and learning are assessed at junior cycle.

It is important to note also that all of these changes are taking place in the context of a harsh economic climate in which resources are limited and the morale of educators tested, but where the education system is being asked to play a key role in Ireland's economic recovery as well as being relevant to social and civic needs.

It seems therefore an opportune time to explore whether our education system as it stands is fit for purpose and whether it is possible for it to adapt to meet the multiple needs of individuals, community and society.
